What is an Accountable Care Organization (ACO)?

Accountable Care Organizations (ACOs) are groups of doctors, hospitals and other health care providers who come together voluntarily to give coordinated, high-quality care to their Medicare patients. The goal of coordinated care is to make sure that patients, especially the chronically ill, get the right care at the right time while avoiding needless duplication of services and preventing medical errors. When an ACO succeeds both in delivering high-quality care and spending health care dollars wisely, it will share in the savings it achieves for the Medicare program. - Other supportive services as needed.

My provider is participating in an ACO, how will this affect me?

Medicare beneficiaries who see providers that are participating in a Medicare ACO keep all their Medicare rights, including the right to choose any doctors and providers that accept Medicare. Whether a provider chooses to take part in an ACO or not, their patients with Medicare may continue to see them.

How do I know if I am part of the ACO?
